Our Rotary Foundation at Work

Meriwether County Students Benefit from D6900 Competitive Grant



When District Governor Mary Ligon made her official visit to the **Rotary Club of Meriwether County**, she toured the Wrap Around Care Center at Manchester High School - the beneficiary of one of the competitive \$10,000 grants awarded by Rotary District 6900.

A school and community-based partnership providing one-stop Community Access to Resources and Education (CARE) the resource center focuses on the whole child by providing access to resources, services, and opportunities for Meriwether County students. The care centers provide a way for students

to come to school or stay in school and not leave campus during the day. Benefits for students include access to school supplies; personal hygiene products, a food pantry for take-home food for students; access to a laundry center to wash and dry clothes; a counseling center offering professional counseling for students during school hours; a Computer Center providing student access to computers and WIFI, student mentoring through the Check and Connect program, and much more.

The Rotary Club of Meriwether County plays a prominent role within the Wrap Around Care Centers located within Unity Elementary, Mountain View Elementary, Manchester Middle School, Manchester High School, and Greenville Middle High School. In addition to financial support, Rotary members volunteer their services by crafting individual "It's a Girl Thing" bags (building a weekly supply of feminine products in a unique bag). Creating Personal Care bags for students (Washrag, toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, and shampoo in a bag), organizing clothes items within storage bins at each school, arranging, coordinating, and distributing the food items within the Food Pantry and arranging, coordinating, and distributing school supplies.

"Within the teaching profession and with other individuals that work with our students, we have a heart for kids," explains Todd McCrae, Manchester High School principal. "Before the CARE Center was opened, staff members took it upon themselves to purchase items for students, and today we are blessed to have a place for students to access the services and resources they need to stay in school."

Most of the clothing closet stock comes from donations from teachers, staff members, and other individuals or groups within the community. Private contributions from foundations such as the Rotary Foundation, civic clubs, and other organizations continue to donate other items, like hygiene products, food, and school supplies.

Sign Up for Guiding Young Peacebuilders and Get Involved



District 6900 is a designated Champion (!) in the Zones 33 & 34 Youth & Peace in Action (YPA) program, the largest local peacebuilding initiative in Rotary history. On Int'l. Peace Day, Sept. 21st, Youth & Peace in Action (YPA) launched with founding support from Rotary Zones 33 & 34 and collaboration from D6860. This is the largest local peacebuilding initiative in Rotary Int'l. history. Early on, 300+ high schools and youth clubs were first to apply, and across the Zones, 4,300 students are now registered!

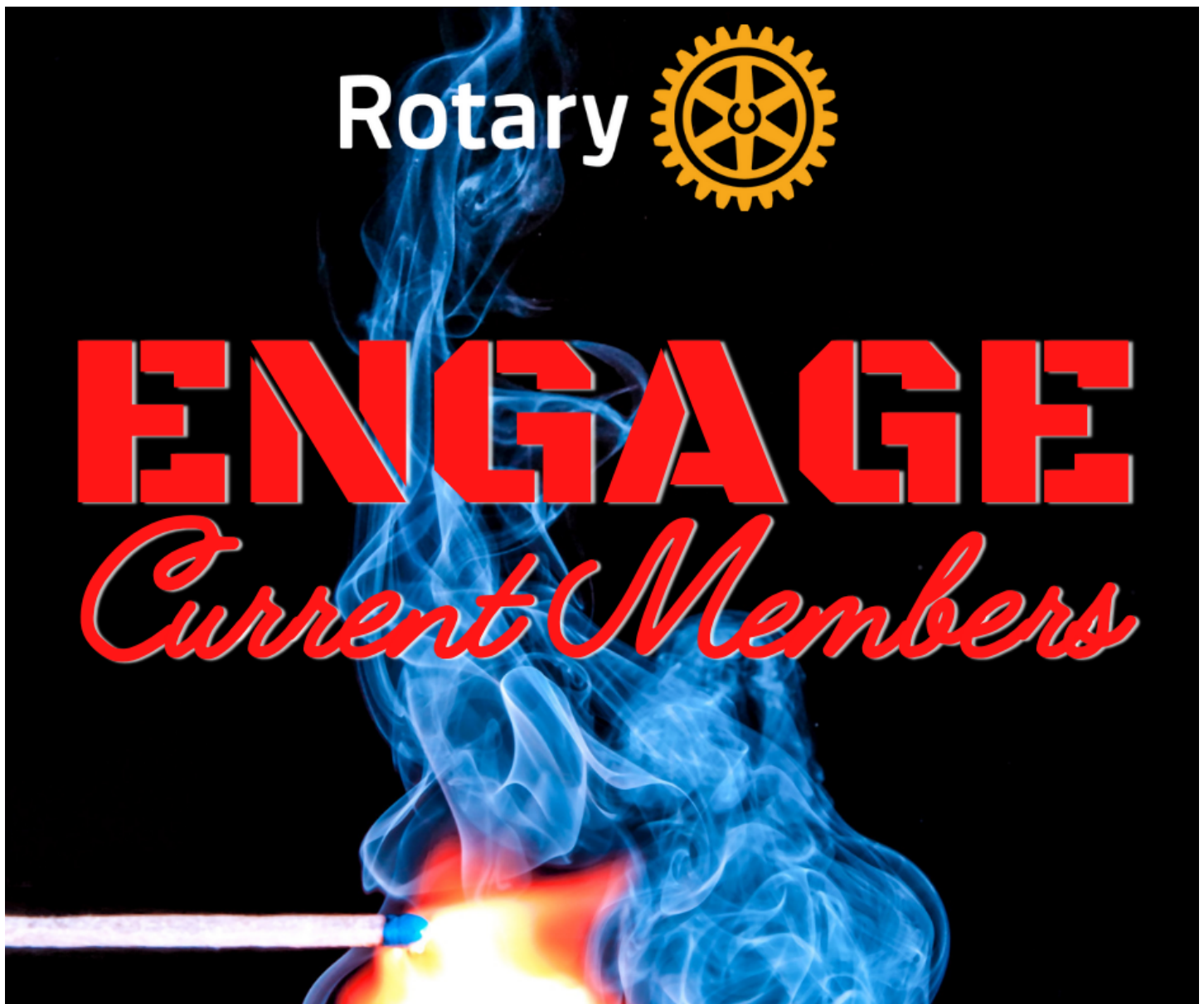

How the Judging Process Looks

- Round One - School Level Winners
 - Essay Judges will work in teams of 3 (1 Team Lead & 2 volunteers) to read and score up to 48 essays by grade by school via Submittable.
 - Essays will be scored using a rubric tool.
 - Volunteers will have approximately one week to score their assigned essays.
 - Teams will meet once virtually for approximately one hour to discuss their assigned student essays; and at this meeting they will select grade winners, school winners and honorable mentions.
- Round Two - State Finalist selection
 - All School Winners will be considered for State Finalist selection
 - Staff and a limited number of Essay Judges will review and discuss each School Winner to select the 15-18 State Finalists
- Round Three - State Winners
 - State Judges will select the 7 State Winners from 15-18 State Finalists
 - State Judges will read and rank State Finalists essays via Submittable
 - Most finalist judges find that it takes 2 to 3 hours to complete the assignment

Americus Rotarians Offer Comfort to Cancer Patients



Chemotherapy Port Pillows Funded by District Grant

What seems like just a small pillow can prove to be a much-appreciated item for someone with a port-a-cath, the device used to draw blood and give treatments, including intravenous fluids, blood transfusions, or drugs such as chemotherapy and antibiotics. The port is placed under the skin, usually in the right side of the chest. The Phoebe Sumter oncology clinic in Americus administers about 2,300 chemo treatments per year and with over 350 cancer patients who access the clinic, the **Americus Rotary Club** wrote for and was awarded a district grant to manufacture and distribute chemo port pillows to help ease the discomfort from seatbelt irritation at the chemo port site. They worked with a local woman-owned clothing manufacturer to make 415 chemo port pillows in a number of colors and designs, and logged over 100 volunteer hours over several days.

Cancer patients who drive or are driven to and from appointments, doctor appointments, chemo, etc. and who have a port (normally placed on either the left side of the chest above the heart or on the right underneath the collarbone), can experience irritation at the port site, which is often where seatbelt rubs. Having had personal experience with a port, Past President Angela Smith was inspired by a Mother's Day gift of a port pillow with other care items given to her prior to the start of chemotherapy in 2020. "What seemed like such a simple solution ended up being one of the most useful items I was given during my cancer battle," stated Smith. The pillow, which attaches to a seatbelt with Velcro straps, can be used on the right or left side depending on which side port is located or whether patient is the driver or passenger.

Elena Carne, local designer and owner of T31 in Americus provided assistance and oversight, and allowed

use of her facility during lunch and after hours to allow working Rotarians to take part in this worthwhile project. The port pillows are small, but practical items that provide extra comfort during a very tumultuous and emotional time and serve as a free resource for men, women, and children. There were 350 donated to the Oncology Clinic of Phoebe Sumter Medical Center with extras going to other clinics in the region. Americus Rotary is grateful to the Rotary Foundation and for the opportunities that District Grants make possible.
