Why We Do All This!

Two years ago, I was asked to take on the role of the District Foundation Chair. I must admit, I was a little hesitant to do so at the time as it had been a while since I had carried a title and the duties of this highly visible and very important position in the district. Truly, I was very honored to be asked to do so by then District Governor Gordon Owen. Now I find myself already two years into it and have just one year remaining to hold this esteemed position. I've been so incredibly blessed to have such wonderful people working with me such as Mike Mudd, who just won the "Meritorious Service Award," along with Kay Williamson who last year won the district "Meritorious Service Award." Can't find a better team than those two! The rewards for holding this position, I cannot begin to explain to you. However, what I can do is talk about why I do it and what we are striving to do.

I want to draw your attention to the PolioPlus Society photo that accompanies this month's article. Anyone who was around in the early 1960's will recognize the scene being played out. As the US began to roll out the vaccine to the American public this scene was played out across the land. I certainly remember going to take the vaccine at the time. My friend and fellow Roswell Rotarian Jonathan Crooks related to me his own personal experience at his elementary school in upstate New York when he went to take it. He said he remembered being told he had to go and get this and was frightened not by what he had to take, as he had no concept of what it was about as a five-year-old, but rather feared the needle he knew he was going to have to take. He HATED needles, they were big and they hurt. When he arrived, he found that not only did he not have to have a needle, but to his delight, it was a sugar cube, and it tasted just fine. What a relief it was for all of us at that time to get the sugar cube. But the picture in the photo really tells the rest of the story. You see very clearly the frightened look on the faces of the mothers as they hoped and prayed that their son or daughter would be fine and this would protect them. You observe the folded hands over the mother's chest and the handkerchief blotting the tears of fear. Even the fathers look rather trepid as they

quietly stand in line as well, wanting to be brave for their children as their own stomachs were churning. It was real fear for all our parents back in the day. A day now long in our past.

However, the battle continues all around the globe for mothers and fathers and children just as you see in the picture even yet today. Those of you who were at District Conference saw firsthand what it could do to children and its permanent effects.

Let's look at the cost to administer this vaccine today. Because of Rotary and all our wonderful partners, the cost is an average of \$3.00 to fully protect a child against polio according to my friend Kim Walden of the EPNC Social Media and Worldwide PolioPlus Society. She explained to me that the \$3.00 cost includes not only the vaccine, but also the activities required to deliver the vaccine including transportation costs, vaccinator stipends, vaccine carriers, the chalk required to mark the house after each visit and dye to paint the children's fingers purple to show they had been vaccinated. That is incredible to me to think that all that is accomplished for just \$3.00 per child. Even keeping in mind that a child requires several doses of the vaccine to be fully vaccinated, it still is a small price to pay to ensure the child is protected.

This is a battle that still must be waged year after year all around the world in order to achieve our Rotarian goal of full eradication. Even when we do reach that goal, we can never let up for a minute to ensure that no child born will ever again have to face the disease.

We as Rotarians are committed to making this dream come true and it truly is a dream we will achieve, because it is what we do and we know why we do it. Just look at the picture again and remember your own time when you received the vaccine and you'll always know in your heart why you keep pushing to make the dream a reality.

Together, we will:

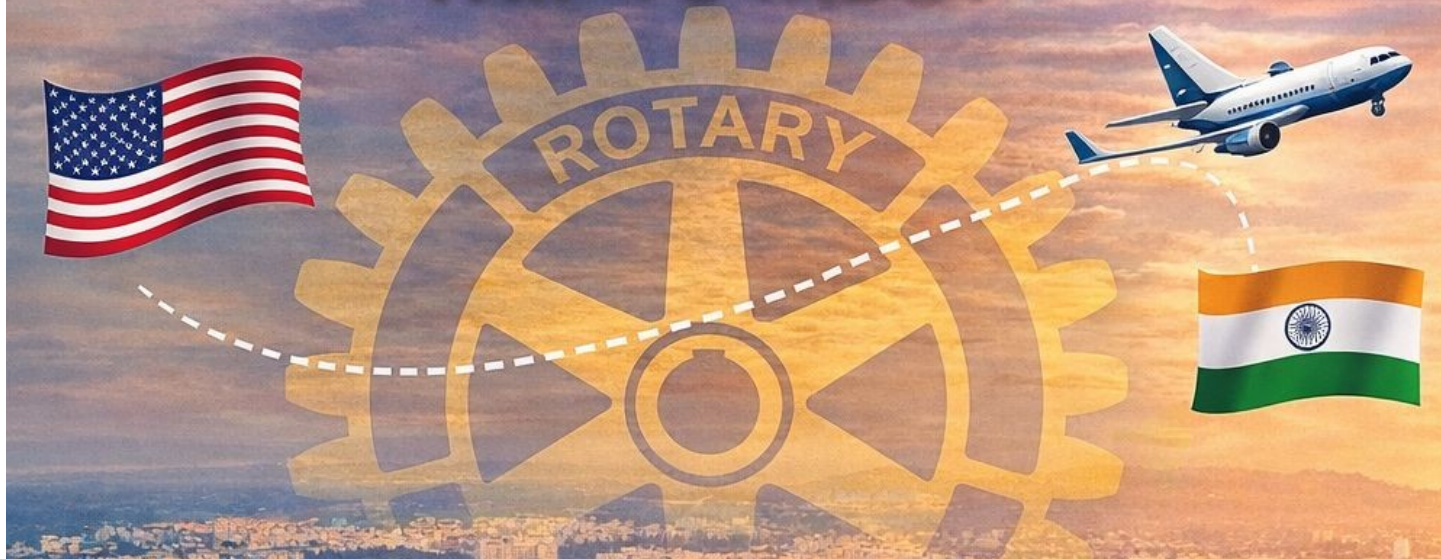
- Assemble **25,000 dignity bags** for survivors of human trafficking

Registration Open for the 2026-2027 Contest Year



Registration is now open for the 2026-2027 Georgia Laws of Life Essay Contest! We invite Rotary Clubs across Georgia to reconnect with existing school partners and begin building relationships with new schools interested in participating.

Over the past two decades, nearly 900,000 student essays have been written through the Georgia Laws of Life Essay Contest, giving students across Georgia the opportunity to reflect on the values and principles that guide their lives through character-building and reflective writing.

The contest is offered free of charge to all Georgia public and private high schools and participation is accepted on a first-come, first-served basis. Schools are encouraged to register by September 1, with student essay submissions due in February.

Each year, the contest reaches more than 30,000 students through reflective writing that strengthens character development, literacy, and communication skills. At an average cost of just \$5 per student or \$2,500 per school, Rotary partnerships continue to play a vital role in ensuring the program remains accessible to schools and students statewide.

Now is a good time for clubs to:

- Reconnect with current school partners and confirm participation
- Introduce the program to new schools in your community
- Confirm club sponsorship and complete the 2026-2027 sponsorship form
- Access school recruitment and partnership resources

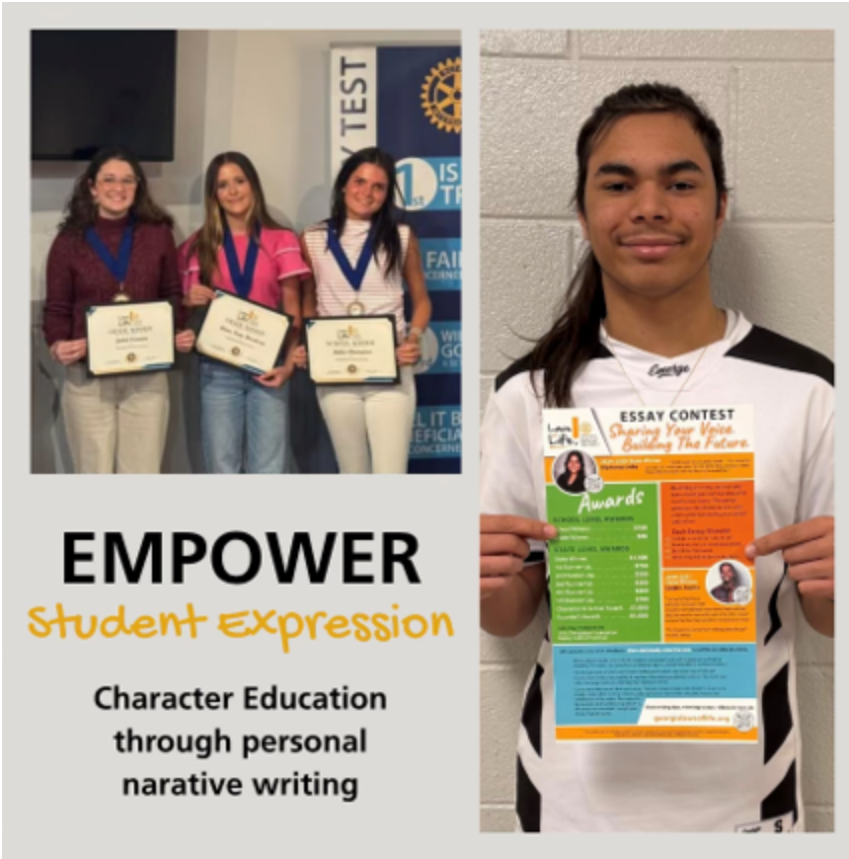

Griffin Presents \$5,000 J. Henry Walker III Scholarship



The **Rotary Club of Griffin** is proud to announce Jon Walker Blalock, a senior at Spalding High School, as the recipient of the 2026 J. Henry Walker III Scholarship, a \$5,000 scholarship awarded annually to a deserving Spalding County student. Established on behalf of the J. Henry Walker family and administered by the Rotary Club of Griffin, the scholarship honors the life and legacy of J. Henry Walker III, a distinguished Griffin businessman, athlete, civic leader, and longtime Rotarian whose life exemplified leadership, service, excellence, and integrity. The scholarship selection criteria reflect the qualities that defined Walker's life, including scholastic achievement, athletic accomplishment, extracurricular involvement, good citizenship, and personal integrity.

Blalock was selected from a competitive pool of applicants representing local high schools across Spalding County. According to the scholarship committee, his accomplishments stood out across academics, leadership, athletics, and community engagement. He maintains a weighted GPA of 4.45 and ranks second in his graduating class while earning recognition through the National Honor Society, National Beta Club, AP Scholar Award, Georgia Certificate of Merit, and honors in Advanced Placement coursework and regional science competitions.

Beyond academics, Blalock has excelled as a student-athlete, earning varsity letters in cross country, swimming, and tennis, serving as tennis team captain and cross-country co-captain, and competing in state-level athletic events. His leadership extends across numerous organizations, including serving as president of the Spalding High School Key Club, Peer Court, and Civic Engagement Club, as well as secretary for Rotary Interact and Jags United. He has also demonstrated a commitment to service and responsibility through his work as a lifeguard at the Spalding County Aquatic Center.

Blalock plans to attend the University of Georgia, where he will pursue financial planning on a pre-law track.

"Jon Walker Blalock embodies the spirit of the J. Henry Walker III Scholarship through his commitment to academic excellence, leadership, service, and personal integrity," said representatives of the Rotary Club of Griffin. "We are proud to recognize his accomplishments and excited to see the impact he will continue to make in the future."

J. Henry Walker III was a lifelong Griffinite whose remarkable achievements included success as a collegiate athlete, business leader, community servant, and dedicated Rotarian for more than five decades, including service as Rotary Club president from 1969-1970. The scholarship continues his enduring legacy by supporting future generations of student leaders in Spalding County.

Columbus Celebrates Laws of Life



There was something powerful in the room as students from Shaw High School and Chattahoochee County High School stood to share the personal values that guide their lives through the Georgia Laws of Life Essay Contest at the **Rotary Club of Columbus**. More than just an essay competition, the program gives young people the opportunity to reflect on the truths, lessons, and voices that shape who they are becoming.

A “Law of Life” is a personal motto or principle that influences decisions and character. For some students, those lessons came from parents or grandparents. For others, they were shaped through hardship, perseverance, faith, or the encouragement of someone who believed in them. Through their writing, students reminded everyone in attendance just how much wisdom, resilience, and hope exists within the next generation.

This year, students from Shaw High School and Chattahoochee County High School submitted more than 550 essays combined as part of the statewide program, which included over 24,000 student essays across Georgia. The Rotary Club of Columbus recognized school winners Wan Sian Long and Shylah Luna, along with numerous honorable mention recipients whose words reflected courage, compassion, determination,

and purpose on April 29th.

As selected essays were read aloud during the meeting, the audience was moved not only by the talent of the students, but by the depth of character they already possess. Their stories served as a reminder that young people carry incredible potential inside of them when given the opportunity to reflect, grow, and share their voices.

Special recognition was also given to educators Molly McVay, Jasmine Mathis, and Tanya Jones for helping bring the Laws of Life program into their schools and investing in the growth and leadership of their students.
